Direct transmission of COVID-19 between volunteers, NHS staff and members of the public.	 a) If the volunteer is symptomatic or living with someone who is symptomatic they will not attend the garden until the appropriate <u>self-isolation period is completed</u>. b) Volunteers at a higher risk of severe illness from COVID-19 will complete an individual risk assessment and agree with the group what action is required. c) Volunteers will be required to wear a face covering before being allowed access to the building and when moving about the building unless there is a reasonable justification not to (medically exempt). d) Volunteers will practice physical distancing, staying 2 metres away from others. The hospital will be organised to allow volunteers to maintain a 2-metre separation at all times between themselves and: i. other members of the public ii. the NHS Staff Volunteers must not consider the wearing of face coverings as a suitable alternative to physical distancing. e) Windows and doors will be opened to improve ventilation where it is appropriate to do so. The Fire Safety Risk Assessment (NHS provided for building) should always be reviewed before any internal doors are held open. f) If a volunteer starts to show Covid-19-like symptoms during the activity they must immediately return home to start self-isolation and arrange to be tested. If a symptomatic volunteer requires to be collected they will be: g) isolated from the rest of the group until they can be collected. h) provided with a fluid-resistant face mask which they will be required to wear until they have left the site. i) If any volunteer repeatedly refuses to stay at least 2 meters away or refuses to wear a face covering without reasonable justification and Bo'net: i. believe there is a very real and immediate or imminent risk of exposure to COVID-19. ii. feel unsafe at work. 	3	3		9

Blood and body fluid spillage from volunteers who are a suspected or confirmed case of COVID-19 will be cleaned up using an appropriate spill kit. Where spill kit is not available, cover spill with paper towels and contact Health Protection Team within the hospital. Risk Assessment Explanatory Notes

A risk assessment is a careful examination of tasks and activities in the workplace which can cause harm. Managers need to ensure Risk Assessments are carried out for all activities where workplace hazards could affect the health and safety of employees, service users, pupils, volunteers, contractors, or members of the public. Risk Assessments should also consider possible damage to property or the environment.

To complete the risk assessment, you should understand the following definitions: **Hazard**: something with the potential to cause harm or damage to someone or something **Harm**: injury, ill health, psychological harm, industrial disease, death, loss, or damage. **Risk**: the chance or likelihood that a particular hazard could cause harm.

The person carrying out the risk assessment should first identify the hazards arising from the task or activity and the control measures already in place. The risk rating can be calculated using the risk matrix below and appropriate action taken.
